From the minister...

Dear Friends

Perhaps, like me, you feel as though this year could be a 'bumpy ride'. The world, our communities even, seem to be divided along so many fault lines. Without proper care about how we behave, our complicity in making these fractures will cause us to stumble and fall into chasms of our own making.

All the more reason to turn our eyes to Jesus and follow his example. He's the one who showed us how to love well. Jesus showed us God's love and the love we were created to give. Jesus taught us to include — not exclude; Jesus is the one who warned us against causing people to stumble and fall; Jesus is the one who lived and moved amongst those who were dispossessed in the deeply divided world of the time. So Jesus gives us a clear example to follow. It's because of Jesus' example that Christians believe that faith must be practiced in both words and activities that lead to flourishing life.

The Gospel writer Matthew recalls, in chapter 5:1–12, how Jesus taught that we are blessed when we are merciful; when we are peacemakers; and when we are persecuted for following Jesus' way, copying his example. Because of Jesus' words and actions *then*, I think he would tell us *now:*-

You are blessed when you hold on to every shred of integrity you have that contributes to human flourishing and fulness of life for *all*, no matter who tells you to think differently;

You are blessed when you join the struggle against racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, the abuse of disabled people (the list goes on).

You are blessed when you live simply, when you share and when you challenge greed, whenever and however it rears its ugly head;

You are blessed when you are as happy to give as to receive and live generously;

You are blessed when you show mercy, when you keep loving, forgiving and healing;

You are blessed when you seize every opportunity to build stronger and kinder communities where you live and work;

You are blessed when you do not stay silent when you witness oppression, even if it costs you, because, in the long run, the human price of not doing so is so much greater;

You are blessed when you speak up for this precious earth, because it's the only home we have in the universe, it is God created, with an intended richness of variety and interdependent diversity;

You are blessed when you create opportunities for laughter, prayer, conversation and pondering with people who think differently from you about life and about God;

You are blessed when you include people and resist any suggestion that you should exclude;

You are blessed when you create opportunities and take chances to meet and talk with the people other folks would have you believe are different – unwelcome even.

And why are we blessed when we behave like this? Because in doing so, we demonstrate what God's Kingdom is like.

So, whenever we copy Jesus' example, we are bringing about God's kingdom "on earth as it is in heaven" (in God's Kingdom) even now.

Faith is a way of life as much as belief. If we don't copy Jesus' example, we add to divisiveness - even if we stay silent.

Jesus said, "You are blessed when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you on my account. Rejoice and be glad for your reward is great in heaven." (Matthew 5:11–12a)

Eco Matters

<u>Glenorchy Church is an Eco-Church</u>, which was awarded a 'Silver Award' by "A Rocha" several years ago, for fulfilling the required criteria.

We have recycling boxes in the church kitchen for recycling paper, plastic containers, etc. We make use of "Fair Trade" tea, coffee and cleaning materials. We aim to use energy for heating the premises responsibly, which can be a challenge in the winter. We have solar panels on the south facing slope of the roof, which can be seen from the rear car park. They produce more electricity in the summer, when excess can be fed back into the grid.

As individual church members, we are aware of the need to "refuse, re-use and recycle".

One of the criteria for progressing to a further award is cooperative action with other local organisations. We are a corporate member of "Transition Exmouth", who recently held their AGM on our premises. There is now interest towards A Rocha awards in the Exmouth Coastal Churches of Holy Trinity, Exmouth, St Margaret and St Andrew, Littleham and St Mary, Lympstone. We can share ideas with them.

The COP15 Biodiversity Conference, in November 2022. This UN Conference of about 130 countries in Montreal agreed some key aims. They agreed, by 2030, to create conservation areas comprising 30% of their land and 30% of the seas and oceans. It was also agreed that richer countries create a fund of 30 billion dollars (£24 billion) to support biodiversity – actually a 'small' amount in global terms.

Let's pray it happens.

There is now a box in The Vestibule for you to put your used stamps in. These will be used to benefit the work of the Leprosy Mission. Thank you!








At the Coffee Morning on Saturday 4th March there will be a Fairtrade /Traidcraft Stall, at part of the Fairtrade Fortnight.

December is always a busy month for Exmouth Food Bank and this was no exception. Our loyal supporters including churches, schools, clubs, businesses and generous individuals rallied and enabled us to distribute 358 parcels that fed over 920 people. Looking back over 2022 we have provided food for 8,091 people (an 84% increase in demand when compared to 2021) and distributed 3,094 parcels (an increase of 42%). Sadly we are not alone in recording such a spike in numbers as the soaring cost of living means more and more people are being forced to use food banks. However, we are here to help and are in a strong position to continue to support those struggling to put food on the table.

Festive cheer: As well as managing a surge in demand, Exmouth Food Bank volunteers together with representatives from the community, packed and distributed over 300 hampers to those in need of a few festive extras. This year we were also able to provide some additional support to many of our clients in the form of meat and vegetable vouchers. These were gratefully received and resulted in a few unexpected tears - of both relief and joy!

New Year restock: We anticipate that the increase in demand for our services will continue during the next quarter. We now need to focus on replenishing our core stock as we currently need to fill the display trays at least twice a week. We would really appreciate donations of the following: breakfast cereals, tinned soups, baked beans, tinned spaghetti, tins of vegetables, tins of meat and fish, jars of pasta sauce, rice pudding and tins of fruit.

Note: This is an extract from the Food Bank Newsletter, the full copy of which is on the notice board.

Jenny adds: Thank you to everyone at Glenorchy for all your support over the last year, when such heavy demands have been made on the Foodbank. There is also a donation box on the table in the Church entrance on a Sunday Morning and the Food donation box is by the door into the Church.

Each year we send a donation of £3,000 to the Open Door Charity, run by the churches in Exmouth. A letter of thanks and appreciation was read to the Church Meeting, with a report on their activities.

Our Community Hub provides a Café that offers low-cost and free meals, showers and laundry facilities to those in housing crisis, and a Community Fridge, Freezer and Larder. We also run a Parent Hub café for young families and a Baby Bank with free baby items. Craft sessions for refugee women provide a safe space to learn skills, develop creativity, and practise their English. Haven is based in Exmouth Community College offering mental health and emotional wellbeing support to young people aged 11-15 years. Our Men's Shed provides an opportunity to learn and share skills, to work collaboratively on community projects and offers social connection and friendship.

By the end of 2022 we will have:

- Welcomed over 10,000 visitors to our Community Café
- Served more that 800 free meals to those most in need
- Provided 750 support sessions (an increase of 40%)
- Reduced social isolation for 100+ adults through Men's Shed and the Craft Room
- Supported 120 young people with their emotional and mental wellbeing
- Distributed 13,000kg of food through the Community Fridge, Freezer and Larder
- Delivered craft sessions to 40+ refugee women & children
- Provided nearly 200 parents with baby items through our Baby Bank
