Poke the 4 nails (or substitute) into today's heart




Jesus kept loving even when he was nailed to a cross.

#### **Eco Matters**

The Royal Society is an association of scientists founded in 1660 with King Charles II as its patron. King Charles III is now its royal patron. At the end of February 2023 the society published the statement that: "There is no way, with present knowledge, of making aircraft travel environmentally friendly". A sobering thought for those who like to fly regularly.

Aircraft unavoidably put greenhouse gases and other pollutants into the upper atmosphere.

We cannot claim that other forms of transport are much better. Most of our electricity is still generated in gas fired power stations, which means that, although a step in the right direction, electric trains and electric cars are not yet "carbon free". Most cars, buses and many trains still run on petrol or diesel and a change-over will take years.

Included among the very moving prayers used in the World Day of Prayer service, which took place in our church on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> March, was the following, prepared by people in Taiwan, 8000 miles from here, and prayed by Christians around the world on that day:

"Creator God, we thank you for entrusting us with this amazing world rich in natural resources. However, we ignore the cry of Mother Earth: we are facing ecological problems, such as air and water pollution, the waste disposal crisis, the over-utilisation of hillsides, habitat destruction and climate change. God of life, may your kindness fill our hearts and guide us to protect Mother Earth."

#### **Christian Response to Eastern Europe**

The March truck left on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> March and arrived in Ukraine by Monday 21<sup>st</sup>, and was immediately offloaded, and the aid dispatched to where it was most needed. The next truck will go to Moldova in April. The warehouse will be open on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> April 10am-3pm in Spider Lane, and again on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> April 10am -1pm.

As you may have seen on the news, vandals broke into the store and did a lot of damage to the windows and poured soup and other food over the clothes and other donations left ready to be loaded on the truck a few days later. The volunteers cleaned up the store and packing room and disposed of the damaged goods. Most of the windows were broken and have been boarded up until repairs can be done and more security put in place.

I can pick up donations of food, clothing, bedding, kitchenware etc all in good condition late on Tuesday and on Wednesday after 9.30am. *Jenny Newman* 

#### The Food Bank

We held another Job Fair on February 23 to replace our usual Thursday morning. There were several reasons for this which included request by employers, as many were struggling with recruitment. We ourselves are constantly looking for new clients to use the Job Café, and generally help the local community.

On the day there were seven organizations who joined us, all of which said they would be happy to attend future events we might hold. This time I wanted to lean on the advice and guidance side of life, which is why I had asked providers such as Careers South West, the National Careers service, and Seetecpluss. We also had Berry Recruitment, Haven, Avon and Home Instead, who incidentally interviewed one of our clients, and since the Fair recruited them into full time employment!

We had a slightly different approach this time, as we set up laptops in the vestibule for those who wanted to carry on their job search on the day. Timings were also slightly different, in so much as we advertised the Fair from 10am to 12pm, which seemed to work.

All in all, lessons were learnt from both Job Fairs, should we decide to do it all again. Many thanks for all those who helped on the day, it was much appreciated! All quite smooth on the day!

# Hope against hope, if we truly believe in the victory of the Risen Christ. A message for Ukraine from their Bishop in London

Today the entire world sees the senseless violence in Ukraine and the suffering of the Ukrainian people. An entire country almost three times the size of the UK is being bombed and invaded, with the civilian population intentionally targeted, day after day. In those Ukrainians we recognise our own fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, sons and daughters. We think, but for the grace of God, there go I. And the Spirit of Truth moves us to compassion towards the widows and orphans, towards the mother with young children whose husband is defending his land from the invader. While the world community has shown great solidarity and support, and a willingness to take in at least some of the millions of persons displaced by the war, if the evil that has arisen is to be defeated, and it must be defeated for humanity's sake, then we must do more. Above all, we cannot and must not look away, like those who saw the suffering Christ being led to Golgotha, but did not want to get involved, for the Crucified Christ is present in those who suffer. Let us pray for Ukraine and its people, that the Cross it is bearing be not unto death, but unto life. May they find strength and courage to withstand the terror that has been visited upon them. And let us also pray for the invaders, that the Holy Spirit may open their eyes and that they be horrified by their works. But let us also be assured of Christ's victory, for in His Resurrection He sets free those who understand what it means to be children of the Light.

On average we are continuing to distribute 300 parcels per month to feed over 650 people - which means that our volunteers are busily packing 20% more parcels than they did this time last year! Contingency plans are in place should numbers surge post April 2023, but for now, thanks to the huge support provided by volunteers and donors, the Food Bank is holding firm.

Preparations for Easter are well underway. As usual we will supplement our food parcels with Easter eggs to bring some extra joy to families with children.

#### **Advice and support for clients**

As a team we work hard to ensure that people accessing the Food Bank are signposted to agencies that will help them to address the underlying issues that have led them to needing our services. On a Friday afternoon clients have face to face access to a Citizens Advice Advisor. This has proved invaluable in addressing a range of financial queries in a clear and timely manner. This month, beginning on Tuesday 14 March, we are pleased to announce that on alternate Tuesday afternoons clients will also be able to talk to an officer from East Devon District Council's Financial Resilience Team.

On Tuesday 7 March we were delighted to host a 'cost of living' pop-up clinic provided by Seachange, who provided advice about grants and tips for saving energy.

It's great to see how our clients are benefiting from such effective partnership working.

#### **Extending emergency out of hours support**

We now have emergency out of hours parcels located in 21 venues in and around Exmouth including schools, churches, medical centres and our referring agencies. The parcels are given to people who urgently need food when the Food Bank is closed. Parcels are replenished by Food Bank volunteers as soon as they have been used.
